## **HISTORIC ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE CHANGE IN CORPORATE NAME**

**Siksika Nation, AB, December 5, 2022,** Siksika Resource Developments Ltd. (“SRDL”) will historically retire on January 1, 2023, after nearly twenty-six (26) years in business, and transition to Siksika Group of Companies LP (“SGC”). SRDL has been in operation since February 20, 1997; has evolved through many eventful changes, accomplished remarkable successes, and survived many challenges throughout its existence.

The SRDL Shareholders (Chief and Council), Board of Directors, and Interim Chief Executive Officer are elated to announce the change which has gone through all the proper legal requirements, approved by both governing bodies, and ratified by Band Council Resolution (BCR #2020-59).

The SGC Management Team is currently working with Chatterson, the Nation’s Marketing Firm, for our rebranding development. A new logo was designed, which depicts our businesses, and our new website is currently under construction, [www.siksikagc.com](http://www.siksikagc.com), and is scheduled to go live in 2023.

A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) was signed between Siksika Group of Companies (SGC) and Siksika Treasury (related body), on July 6, 2022. SGC acknowledges the transparency of the MOA and its accountability to the Siksika Nation through Siksika Nation Chief and Council. SGC also recognizes that it has certain financial reporting obligations to the Siksika Treasury pursuant to the Siksika Nation Financial Administration Law (FAL).

The SGC Management Team would like to honor and recognize all the former Shareholders, Board of Directors, Chief Executive Officers, Chief Financial Officers, Managers, and employees who left their footprint in SRDL’s road to success, who contributed their time and shared their wealth of business knowledge and ideas for the Nation’s Company.

We also thank our current Leadership, Board of Directors, Managers, and staff for their continued hard work during this transition period. We also look forward to working with our Community Members in our efforts towards building new lifelong achievements in business.

## Blackfoot Crossing on Nov. 25 receives Chief One Gun's beaded medicine belt bought from Cluny resident in 1960's.

December, "isstomahkatoyiksistsi kaato si", is a long cold winter, "istoyi", month that our peoples have experienced since time and memorial. Our peoples were independent and wise survivalists enduring years of cold and harsh winters to provide for there family and giving back to mother earth in return. In this month, animals also are prone to the cold for there is less food. They will migrate along the river seeking the nutrients they need.

Early in December we have been receiving a huge family of white-tailed deer right outside near the escarpment of a Buffalo Jump, more frequent coyote packs and Moose trotting along the paths. It's always a spectacle to watch in awe as the beast-like visitors pass by Blackfoot Crossing even for just a moment.

On November 25th, before the beginning of the new month Blackfoot Crossing had received an item from Willa Morrisette, on behalf of the Campbell family. This item is the beaded medicine belt from members of Chief One Gun's family during approximately 1965. The item was purchased by Patricia Campbell, a resident of Cluny. At the time of purchase, she was told that the belt belonged to Chief One Gun. Patricia paid \$30 dollars for the belt. The item was treated with the utmost respect and carefully stored away. It's truly a blessing to receive items and artifacts of our peoples and in turn we will preserve them.

On December 16th, Blackfoot Crossing held there Christmas dinner at Grey Eagle Casino. Staff had a wonderful time getting together to mark the end of the year and embark onto the next. We remember those that have made remarkable accomplishments to Blackfoot Crossing and the community.

Each staff member and each Siksika member along the journey has a part to play.

We hope you all have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

**There have been several dog bites reported in your area.**

**What can you do?**

- We know that dogs who are having their needs met (food, water, shelter) are much less likely to become a nuisance or act aggressively. If you have a dog, this is a reminder to make sure **your dog/s have access to appropriate shelter, fresh water, and food daily**. As the winter temperatures drop, please consider increasing the amount you are feeding your outdoor dog. Outdoor dogs use more calories in the winter to stay warm.
- If your dogs aren't fixed, you may want to consider getting them **spayed/neutered**. Dogs who aren't fixed are more likely to become involved in a bite incident. Please contact a local veterinary clinic for more information.
- Always supervise dogs and children.
- If you or a family member are bitten by a dog, try to get a good description of the dog. If we can't positively identify the dog, we won't be able to enforce the Siksika Dog Care and Control Bylaw.

# Historic partnership between Closer to Home and Siksika Nation looks to build stronger supports for Indigenous families

In late October, Closer to Home Community Services and Siksika Nation signed a historic agreement – a first-of-its-kind memorandum of understanding, that both groups hope provides better support services for Indigenous families in Calgary.

“We are excited and humbled to be partners in this journey,” said Karen Olivier, chief executive officer of Closer to Home, in a joint news release.

The partnership flows from federal legislation passed in 2019 that affirmed Indigenous communities’ jurisdiction in child and family services.

Closer to Home supports families with an approach grounded in the Teaching Family Model – an evidence-based, trauma-informed process equipping families with tools to support themselves and their children early on.

Olivier said this method aims to preserve family relationships “at all costs” while ensuring families “become more resilient.”

“We are very strategic about what we provide to a family because they all have strengths, and we’re there to help them uncover that,” Olivier said. “We want parents to be the ones who are empowered to help themselves and help their children.”

The Siksika Nation has nearly 8,000 members, many of whom live in around Calgary.

Authentically supporting Indigenous families is central to Closer to Home Services’ mission as well. Olivier said the last 15 years focused on becoming familiar with Indigenous culture and how to best offer assistance.

The new agreement extends this goal, while also formalizing the partnership and addressing three key areas that will enable Siksika to better support their members:

- Training and employment,
- Affordable housing
- Creating access to Indigenous knowledge and teachings in the city

## Hopes for the future

The organization hopes the new deal will offer more career options for young people living on reserve.

“We’re not just talking about moving our services to the reserve,” Olivier said. “We’re talking about building an infrastructure and training a workforce to be able to provide services to themselves in a cultural, adaptive way, in a way that makes sense for them.”

With inflation and the cost of living skyrocketing – compounded by the shaky rental market – Olivier said committing to developing affordable housing in Calgary is crucial to supporting Indigenous families’ futures.

“Nothing destabilizes the family more than a housing crisis or a financial crisis,” Olivier said. “You

really want to give them the best boost possible to be successful. And so then kids do better and they’ll thrive.”

Closer to Home is also working on a major building project – a six-story community support hub.

The new facility includes 18 affordable housing units and dedicates 8,500 square feet to Indigenous culture and learning, extending knowledge and awareness to Indigenous and non-Indigenous people throughout the city.

Olivier notes how through a Truth and Reconciliation Commission lens, “It’s really about prioritizing Indigenous people in that approach to make sure that they are first-class members getting services when they need them, without barrier.”

## Supporting Bill C-92

Federal legislation passed in 2019 allows Indigenous communities to create and implement their own policies surrounding child and family services so they better align with each band’s values and circumstances. It also allows children to be placed with extended family and community members.

The agreement helps to facilitate and aid in this transfer of authority back to each reserve, outlining

framework which allows Closer to Home to assist Siksika in establishing child support.

Olivier adds that the organization looks forward to collaborating further with Siksika when on these types of projects.

## Setting a precedent

No other nonprofit in Calgary has committed to an agreement such as this with an Indigenous band, according to Olivier. She hopes Closer to Home’s partnership with Siksika can change that.

“I think it will give them hope that it can be done and that they’ll find their way too,” Olivier said. “This cements a kind of a milestone, in terms of what these partnerships can look like, what you could take on in them, what types of agreements you can have without even knowing what that all means yet.”

Olivier adds that the agreement will only make the organization stronger, and the opportunity to collaborate is enough in itself.

“It’s not about being the first, it’s just about being welcomed in to do the work,” she said. “I really feel like a lot of hard work and learning and wondering and wishing kind of has paid off.”



**SUMMARY OF THE CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS**

Public Notice : is hereby given that the Chief and Council has approved the demolition for the buildings located at Old Crowfoot Cluny area.

Project description: The project involves the complete demolition of several structures and appended utilities. The project will be executed in two phases. As per the current schedule, the first phase will include the demolition of the old reservoir & pump house, three old residences, ATCO trailer, hockey rink, two storage buildings, the Parish Hall, and the old residential school foundations and parking lots. The second phase will include the old school mechanical room, tennis court, athletic track, land reclamation, site clean-up, restoration seeding and site grading

**First Phase:**

Starting Date: Nov 28, 2022  
1, 2023

Ending Date: Revised to January 6, 2023  
31, 2023

**Second Phase:**

Starting Date: March

Ending Date: May

Project update as of December 14, 2022. The Residential School site foundation (North), Playground, Tennis Courts, Hockey Rink, Old Water Pumphouse, Storage Building E and the ATCO Trailer have all been

demolished.

The Residential School site foundation and parking lot (South & North), Reservoir & Pumphouse foundation, ATCO Trailer foundation, Storage Building West, Residential House Foundation and Two old Houses west of Nuns quarters are expected to be demolished by December 18, 2022.

The Parish Hall is to be demolished in the new year by January 6, 2023, weather permitting.

Phase 2 will start up in the Spring of 2023 and include the Athletic Track, Mechanical Equipment removal, site grading and seeding.

Heavy construction demolition equipment and trucks will be used to accomplish the work in the above-mentioned site. The access to the construction location will be controlled and the access gates will be kept closed except during active trucking. The work sites will be fenced, barricaded and caution tape will be utilized as required to delineate the work area. No unauthorized person should be within this control zone. Only workers with proper personal protective equipment will be permitted inside the work area.

Anticipated regular work hours will be 8 am – 6 pm, Monday to Saturday. No service interruptions are anticipated as part of this project. Due to expected cold weather, Contractor will be on-site working Sunday, December 18, 2022.
